Watershed Moments

Recently we hosted the Men's Walk to Emmaus and then the Women's Walk to Emmaus. If you know the story of the Walk to Emmaus found in Luke 24:13-35, you understand that in conversation and the breaking of bread, Jesus revealed himself to a pair of very sad followers of Jesus. Later they recalled how their hearts burned within them. Many people say that their experience of Jesus at a Walk to Emmaus retreat was a watershed moment for their faith.

This past week we had nine young people attend a week of Summer Games University in Grinnell, Iowa. This week for several of them and many more who attended from across Iowa was a watershed moment in their faith.

I was recently reminded by a church member of John Wesley's watershed moment in his faith. He was a well-educated Oxford student who knew about God, who God was, and what God means to us. He took all that knowledge and went on a mission to the Colonies and landed in Savannah, Georgia to lead a church in reaching people for Christ. On Wesley's way to Savannah, the ship encountered a storm. There he witnessed a group of Moravians who seemed to have a deep trust in God despite the storm which threatened to sink the ship. John Wesley was a failure in Savannah and returned to England. In London, he had a watershed moment that he describes in his journal on May 24, 1738:

"In the evening I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading [Martin] Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, while he was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone, for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

Many people experience a moment when the God comes to them in a powerful way. As we see from the above examples, it can happen on a retreat as a youth, or an event we attend or even a missiontrip later in life. I know that some experience this during a Sunday morning worship service or a Bible study. Kae and I both have felt God present when we visit Trees, Rocks and Water on vacation. I am in awe when I visit places like the ocean or a canyon and feel close to God.

These moments can be truly life changing. These moments are turning points in our relationship with God that we call faith moments of conversion, renewal, and revelation. These are watershed moments for our faith development and growth.

“A watershed moment is a **turning point**, the exact moment that changes the direction of an activity or situation. A watershed moment is a dividing point, from which things will never be the same. It is considered momentous, though a watershed moment is often recognized in hindsight.”

These moments do help us grow in Grace as we seek to become more and more like Jesus and live a life of faith fully devoted to Jesus. Spiritual Formation is a lifelong process of moments that transform us; it is a process by which Christ is formed in us for the glory of God, for the abundance of our own lives and for the sake of others.

How is it with your faith development, your growth in Grace?

May God bless you with a watershed moment that leads to your inner transformation and deeper growth in grace.

Summer Games University 2023

Youth Trip – July 9th – 14th

We have returned safe and full of faith from Summer Games University 2023! Some of our youth may have given a recap on what the week entailed, but I wanted to give a better picture to everyone that supports and prays for our week there. This is the typical day schedule:

Breakfast/Huddle Time -- (Middle school and high school groups flip flop). Huddles are the small groups they were placed in on Monday and stay the same all week.

Game time -- Huddles play games against other huddles.

Morning Worship -- music, fun challenges against pastors or huddle leaders

Lunch/Huddle Time

Satellites -- They participate in a group focused on their interests. Our youth chose mission work, worship music, art and photography.

Break time -- relax/shower in the dorms

Dinner/Huddle Time

Evening Worship (with a break in between) that includes a longer sermon and more music! Many of our campers said this was their favorite part of the day. It may be due to the message and the things we did each night during worship, but this was my favorite part of the day because ALL the campers worshipped with their hands in the air and singing as loud as they could. We don't see this kind of worship in our churches every week, but here at camp the Holy Spirit is moving in them so strongly. It is a beautiful to witness.

- Monday night I was honored to give the message about creation and your youth group helped everyone visualize how God paid special attention to each thing He made in detail. Thank you for the use of the flashlights!! I talked more about what the word tetelestai = "It Is Finished" means, how we are all made very good and in His image, and how we need to focus on these things through scripture mantras. Then the campers met with their huddles and wrote on clay tiles the negative things they think about themselves. Being vulnerable and giving it to God.
- Tuesday night was an altar call, where youth lined up to be prayed for by the adults. As adults, this was the most heart wrenching yet rewarding experience. We hear all the things they think about themselves. The trauma they've experienced. The demons they fight, and their hopes and dreams. This was a test of our own faith, confidence, and trust in the Lord to give us the right words to pray out loud for these youth. Yet, we see and hear the earthly reward of this when the youth would thank us and report the weight of their burdens lifted. And know that we have modeled prayer to kids that may not know where to start to try.
- Wednesday night is also another emotional night, as we focus on what Jesus did when He died for us, stating that "It Is Finished" about sin separating us from God. We try not to spoil the surprise for the kids that haven't gone before, so don't talk too much about it! But after the message, there is a prayer walk to three crosses, where 3 of the huddle leaders are costumed up to represent Jesus and the two criminals. Our very own youth, Jaxon Morris, was a huddle leader and chosen to be one of the men on the cross. This meant hours up there in silence, holding himself up there. Ask him about his experience sometime!
- Thursday night we learned about the Ascension and what it meant previously with Yom Kippur, but now "It Is Finished". They then took communion in our huddles, and the youth gave their testimonies to each other. Learning how God works through all of them and has gotten them back on the right path through their life trials. They then broke their tiles from Monday that said the negative things about themselves to symbolize Jesus making us new. The smashed tiles were then placed on the "It Is Finished" cross. The campers wanted to worship with music all night after, so they didn't get back to the dorms until midnight!

- Friday is a half day, where we said goodbyes to the “best week of the year” and talked about how to keep the fire for Jesus going when we get home. The youth know they need to stay connected and surround themselves with their Christian peers and mentors to hold themselves accountable and focused on God whenever possible. We know this doesn’t just mean youth group, or church. It means keeping these friends close at school and outside of school. And also including friends that need to hear about Jesus.



Each night of camp we sent out a reflection/journal/survey to check in with how the experience was going for our campers, to help us adults understand and support it better. Here are some of the questions and responses they gave:

What is something you never want to forget about this camp experience?

- The people I spent it with, we grew such close connections. I hope I never forget a single one of them and it was so hard to leave. We just couldn’t let go because of how close we got with only three days of being with Christ.
- To see how God moves through the kids here.
- Genuinely feeling the holy spirit and the amazing people I met.
- All of it!!!
- The feeling of the Holy Spirit inside me. Feeling welcomed and loved by everyone.
- My huddle and relationships made through Jesus.

Is there a favorite game or activity you have done?

- Ultimate football
- Wavelength
- We played a game where you have to make people laugh and not a single person made me laugh. Everyday at lunch we play a bunch of mini games that no one can figure out.
- As a huddle, we really like to play Mafia and some like the number game, but it’s super fun!
- 9 Square



What were some of the things you talked about as a huddle? Anything shared by others (or yourself) made you feel or think deeply?

- We talked about the new kingdom where we will love with God’s ruling and will never break.
- We all shared our background of how we got to know Christ, which was really inspiring to know I’m not alone.
- We got really deep into conversation about creation and about Paul’s notes and stuff. It was really cool and I really enjoyed it.



What topic(s) do you want to learn more about after camp in a devotional, Bible study, or youth group lesson?

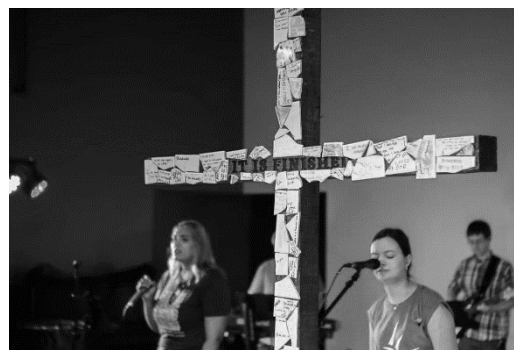
- Anything we've talked about with Christ dying for us and how he also went through what we went through.
- The basics on Jesus and Christianity
- I want to learn more about the book of Revelations
- I'm open to learning anything and everything if I get the chance
- Creation and everybody's testimonies

Has this week changed you and your faith? If so, how? And what do you want to do with that back home?

- Yes, I gave my life to Christ and I hope to continue and further my relationship with God and read my Bible and be more involved.
- I hope to keep in the faith while I am not at sgu.
- Yeah it's really impacted it because I never really cared about God before I came here. On altar night, I changed my entire perspective, and that night I verbally surrendered and accepted Jesus as my Lord and Savior, and I've never felt better. I want to continue that fire, and I don't want that flame to burn out ever.
- It has changed everything and I would love to change my ways towards Jesus instead of away from him!
- Yes absolutely. I accepted Christ as my Savior. At home, I want to live for God and be His ambassador.
- Absolutely, I have grown so much closer with everybody around me and have had so many life changing experiences with my faith.
- I have more faith to spread.

I hope these reflections and my recap help you understand how moving this camp was and how your support and prayers are extremely appreciated. This camp is changing lives and bringing the faith back home to continue growing!

On a personal note, I thank you for giving me the opportunity to lead the youth here at Grace and for strengthening my love for music through contemporary worship. Something I loved about this camp was that it didn't matter what church or denomination anyone was from. It didn't matter what town they were from or what they were wearing. We are all family in Christ. We are all Christians; worshipping the one true God, spreading the news of Jesus, praying the Holy Spirit enters into everyone we come in contact with.

News from the Foundation



July 16th, Pastor Barrie presented the Spencer Sparks and Meadow Busy Bees with a check for \$1,000 from the Grace United Methodist Church Foundation for their Citizenship Project, Backpacks 4 Kids. The goal of the project s to make a BIG impact in our community by raising funds to help a peer group in need by donating to the Backpack Program The club is providing 63 supplied backpacks and 63 earphones/earbuds for students from Preschool to 8th Grade. This project was selected to go to State.

Moving Through Grief into Mourning

Grace UMC has been on quite a journey. Over the last several months, there have been feelings of hurt, woundedness, loss, grief and a whole range of emotions. In the last couple of months, there have also been other emotions: relief, gratitude and thanksgiving. All of the above are part of the process of mourning.

Grief is an internal response to loss. Grief must be converted into mourning—the outward expression of loss—for us to move through grief to healing. Alan Wolfelt, Director of the Center for Loss and Life Transition has identified six needs of mourning.

- 1) Acknowledgement of the reality of loss: Things will never be the same. Grace UMC's identity, some of our members, and some of our past activities are gone from our present reality.
- 2) Embrace and/or befriend the loss: Understanding the hurt that needs healing. We don't forget the woundedness or hurt. We call upon the Holy Spirit to surround us with Christ's healing love and light, so that the pain can be transformed.
- 3) Remembering and honoring the loss: Moving from presence to memory. Just as we remember and celebrate what Grace UMC went through and survived in its early years, we now do with our recent situation. What was is now in the past. We remember and honor the woundedness and hurt as we move through the pain into healing.
- 4) Developing a new self-identity: Working on who we will be after the loss. This is a process of exploring possibilities for the future. It is a time for experimentation as we ask questions, try new things, and search out different avenues for ministry within our congregation and the Spencer community.
- 5) Searching for meaning: Grace UMC has had significance within the lives of many persons in our congregation and within the Spencer community. We now have an opportunity to create meaningful and different connections in both places.
- 6) Receive and accept on-going support: As we continue to build a different congregational life, we need to give and receive support from each other, community organizations, friends, neighbors, and other congregations in and around Spencer.

We are adjusting to a different church life. Just like the stages of grief, the needs of mourning are not linear. People will work through them in different orders and at different times during their grief process. Be gentle with each other. Listen. Be present. Let God do God's work. God isn't finished with us, yet.

“So we're not giving up. How could we! Even though on the outside it often looks like things are falling apart on us, on the inside, where God is making new life, not a day goes by without his unfolding grace.” (2 Cor. 4:10, The Message)

Blessings as we continue this journey towards a new beginning.

We have seamstresses in our church making the one-handled cloth bags for these Student Kits, but we would welcome supplies to put in them. Here is the shopping list for the student kits:

- 3 notebooks – 1 subject spiral 8 x 10 ½
- 1 Ruler – 12” Long with metric
- 6 Pencils – unsharpened
- 1 Pencil sharpener
- 1 Eraser – 2” or larger
- 1 Box of 12 Colored Pencils
- 1 Box of 24 Crayons
- 1 Pair of Student Scissors

All placed in a Cloth one-handled bag or a plastic grocery bag so we can put it in a cloth bag.

The Loom - Make Sleeping Mats

One of the projects of the Midwest Mission Center in Jefferson, Iowa is making Plarn Sleeping Mats. Plarn is plastic yarn made out of plastic grocery bags. The Sleeping Mats are sent internationally and locally. They are great for those who need a barrier between them and the hard ground. They have been sent for disaster relief, for the homeless, and for those who need temporary sleeping arrangements.

We have started collecting plastic bags, cutting those bags, making Plarn out of them and using it for making Sleeping Mats. We have two Looms from the Midwest Mission center and we have begun making Sleeping Mats on them. We have designated a room in our lower level for this project. As the room gets set up it will be fun to have a group of people come and work together on this project for a morning or afternoon.

Weighted Works With Love

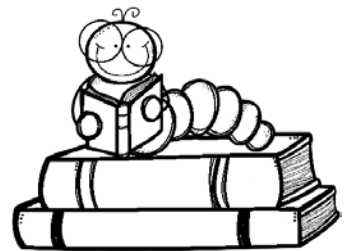

Grace United Methodist Church 2023 Foundation Disbursement

The annual meeting of the Grace United Methodist Church Foundation Board of Directors was held on Monday, February 16, 2023. The Annual Report from the Foundation Board to the congregation was reported on Sunday, February 26, 2023.

There was an availability of \$55,636.44, which was 4% of the year end 2022 Foundation fund value, to be evenly split, making \$13,909.11 available for each of the following four categories:

- A. Global and Local Missions;
- B. Capital Improvements;
- C. Outreach and Emerging Ministries; and
- D. Educational Opportunities.

Undesignated funds distributed by the Foundation to Grace United Methodist Church are available for disbursement to the various ministries and the mission of Grace United Methodist Church. Grants can only be made available for requests that are not ordinarily considered part of the annual operating budget of Grace United Methodist Church, which includes salaries, maintenance, supplies, utilities, etc.

The Foundation Disbursement Committee met on June 12, 2023, and approved the applications for the 2023 Foundation Funds. The Administrative Council members approved the report from the Foundation Disbursement Committee on June 26, 2023.

The Foundation Disbursement Committee consists of the following members: Lenny Heerd, Karen Seversen, Rev. Dr. Barrie Tritle, Judith Olson (Administrative Council Chair), and Cyndi O'Hara (Administrative Council Vice Chair).
