FEBRUARY 14 – ASH WEDNESDAY

The Mark of the Cross

"Then Jesus told his disciples, If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." Matthew 16:24

A story that my family loved to share about my sister, who was a United Methodist minister, reminds us every year about the significance of Ash Wednesday. She was preparing for an Ash Wednesday service where she always marked each congregant with the sign of the cross on their forehead. This one year she decided to use oil instead of ashes, choosing cinnamon oil. After prayers and hymns, one by one each person came forward to receive the sign of the cross on their forehead and then kneel at the railing. A young boy received the oil on his forehead; and within a few seconds, he started rubbing his forehead. Others seemed to be concerned about their marks as well. As they took their seats, the people could see that the oil had left a red cross on each of them, leaving them wondering how long the cross on their forehead would last. When my sister realized that the oil she had used was too strong, she apologized profusely, and there were some chuckles around the church.

This story turned into a teachable moment for my sister, for us, and for the congregation. The cross is a sign that Jesus died for each of us. How does that impact our lives? We don't always realize that the cross that we are marked with has changed our lives forever. It is not always easy to bear the cross of Christ. Let us try to live our lives with courage and conviction in the knowledge that Jesus died for each of us.

One of my favorite hymns is on Page 159 of the United Methodist Hymnal: <u>Lift High the Cross.</u>

"Lift high the cross, the love of Christ proclaim till all the world adore His sacred name."

We Are God's Field

1 Corinthians 3:9

In Paul's letter to the church in Corinth, he says, "For we are God's fellow workers, you are God's field, God's building." As I read this verse, I ask, how does Paul's message relate to my life? How am I "God's field"?

I grew up on a farm and am familiar with the cyclical nature of planting corn and beans. You cultivate the land to prepare it for planting. You plant using superior quality seed. You control the weeds. Harvest comes after the crops have grown, and time and weather have matured them. All these steps occur in an appropriate order and timeframe. How do I cultivate my "land" – my mind and spirit? I attend church; I participate in small groups; I read the Bible; all help me grow closer to God.

How about the rocks found each year in the fields that can damage equipment? Removing the rocks is a continual process. What are spiritual "rocks" that I carry with me? How can I dig out those thoughts and experiences that interfere with my spirit and growing closer to God? What about the weeds? Are there habits and activities that interfere with my desire to improve my spiritual life? Pull them out!

Just as God provides the rain and the sun necessary to grow crops, I must turn to God for my "nutrients" to become a mature Christian. To test your spiritual soil, ask these questions: Am I holding on to sin that I need to let go? Have I allowed bitterness to take root in my life? Finally, what about the winter months when a field lies fallow to restore its health and usefulness? In the same way, I wait expectantly but patiently. It is in God's timing.

Prayer: Dear Jesus, help me to be a good farmer in my own field. I want to grow a strong spiritual "crop" for God. Amen.

Read John 10:1-16

Read Matthew 7:3-5


"And why do you look at the speck in your brother's eye but do not consider the plank in your own eye?" Matthew 7:3

Why Do We Pray?

I was recently asked: Why do we pray?

For me, it is communication with God that lets God into my life and aligns my heart and mind with God. Unfortunately, we often wander from God in our daily lives; and only when we have a troubled time, do we turn to God.

Two examples for me: First, when I was in seminary training to be a pastor and was serving as a chaplain at a hospital in Atlanta, Georgia, I had three death calls in one day and was worn out and troubled by the events of the day. I sat down in the Chaplain's office and began talking to God and wondering if I was called to this work. I was guided to study the scriptures and found Hebrews 3:1-6. It spoke to me and reminded me that I do indeed share a heavenly calling, that I should keep my attention on Jesus, be faithful as he was faithful, and bear witness to God through my life.

The second was when my Grandma Irene Tritle died, and I was in grief. I attended my first five-day Academy for Spiritual Formation at the Cedar Falls American Martyrs retreat center. During this time, I came to grips with some of my emotions and felt the deep sense of abandonment because she was the one who raised me after my parents' death, and now all my grandparents were gone along with my parents. I went for a walk and sat down by a statue of Jesus being held by Mary. This caused me to have a conversation with God about my grief, loss, and abandonment. In that moment a lullaby came to me as a gift:

Sweet Little Baby Sweet Little Holy Child You're in the arms of Love. Peace, Peace be still! This song has risen in my mind many times since this day to remind me of God's constant love even during tragedy and pain.

How would you answer the question: Why do we pray?

My rhythm of prayer has moved from only at difficult times to a more constant being in the presence of God. I use the rhythm of prayer called the **ACTS** of prayer. Adoration for God and who God is, **C**onfession of how I have wandered from God, **T**hanksgiving for God's Grace, Healing and Hope, and **S**upplication for those who suffer and are in harm's way, seeking ways to be present with them with God's love.

May you be blessed in your prayer life and grow in grace.

Prayer: Eternal God, it is amazing how you reach out to us with your love. Help me by leading me so that I do not wander from your ways. Thank you for the gift of your constant abiding love! Be with all my loved ones who are struggling today and bring peace to our world. In Christ's name I pray. Amen.

God Is Able To Do What God Promises

'Hoping against hope, he (Abraham) believed that he would become "the father of many nations"...No distrust made him (Abraham) waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised'.

Romans 4:18, 20-21 (NRSV)

Even though Abraham and Sarah were old and beyond childbearing age, God promised Abraham that "he would become the father of many nations". Abraham might have thought –"OK, God, but I don't understand how this is going to happen"! Abraham was a faithful man and followed God's directions; even leaving his ancestral lands and extended family to settle in a far-off country. Not only did Abraham trust that God would be able to do what God had promised, he didn't even waver in that trust!

Most young couples dream of the children they will have, picking out names, thinking about who they will look like and what talents they might inherit. Early in our marriage we learned the devastating fact that having biological children was not a possibility for us, crushing our dreams of a family. Since I couldn't be a mother, I reacted by descending into grief and depression, not understanding what I was to be and do.

During this time, I came upon this Romans passage: "No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised". You see, Barrie had a pastoral visit with a church member who was a licensed social worker doing adoption home studies. She placed us on a lawyer's list who did adoptions and started our home study process. Then the waiting began. This lawyer only had 2-3 adoptions per year. In the fall of 1984, 3 babies were placed for adoption through that lawyer. During that same time, spoke to Barrie in a dream saying: "You will have a son and will name him Joshua". Even though it looked like our chances for a baby were dim, I learned through the Romans verse and, oh did I lean on that verse—through January, February, March, and April! In May we were notified that a young woman had contacted the lawyer about releasing her baby for adoption. We were next on the list! Joshua was born June 21st.

The birth mother released him for adoption, and the court proceedings took place. We picked up our new son on June 27, 1985.

During difficult times over the course of my adult life, I have continued to lean on that verse – through the adoptions of our other 2 sons, through one child's many surgeries, through another one's addiction treatment, and another one's continued mental health care. God <u>does do</u> what God has promised—to stay with us, to support us, to guide us, to give us strength, and to place helpers and assistance in our path. We are never alone with God at our side.

Prayer: Loving Lord, we are so thankful that you do follow through on your promises. We are blessed that you stay by our side, encouraging us, giving us strength, guiding us, and sending helpful persons in the midst of our distress. Help us to always place our trust in you even when circumstances make it difficult to do so. Help our faith to never waver as we remember that we can count on you to do what you have promised to do. Amen.



I often feel helpless and guilty; other times I also feel compassion and closeness. I have learned that I can only do so much to allow her to be happy and comfortable. I know I must accept the direction our lives have taken to do my best for her. Placing my mother in a care center has often had me reflecting on my own life in relationship to hers. Selfishly, I fear coming up short of both moral and social expectations. I have found I can only walk through this time of life in faith with the support of my wife and others. Doing the right thing must be some sort of sacred mystery; the purpose of which will be revealed to me in time.

Prayer: Father, give me grace in caring for my mother. I seek your wisdom. I know these days are the final opportunities for a deeper expression of love for the most important human relationship in my life. Allow me to show the same love I have for her that I know she has for me! Open my mind to this understanding and allow me to express all the love I feel in my heart in both actions and my thoughts! I humble myself before you and her! In Jesus' name, Amen.

Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life". John 14:6


